

Notice of proposal relating to Pangbourne Meadows - Adventure Dolphin Storage Compound Extension

The Parish Council has received a request from Adventure Dolphin, the charity who manage the Dolphin Centre, to extend their existing outdoor boat storage area.

The charity has requested permission from Pangbourne Parish Council, as landowners, to extend the fence line of their existing compound by 15 metres beyond its existing boundary to create an additional 132sq metres of storage space. The land into which the compound will extend is a section of Pangbourne River Meadow, also owned by Pangbourne Parish Council. The area is currently overgrown. Any vegetation and smaller trees will be cleared, with larger trees being retained. Careful consideration will be given to landscaping along the new fence line and under new planning laws an ecological survey will be required and the project will need to demonstrate a positive net gain on biodiversity of at least 10%.

The existing compound is used primarily for storing canoes and kayaks but also houses equipment for Pangbourne Fete. The additional fence would be a chain-link material to match the existing fence. The objective is to offer further, safe and secure storage for equipment used by the charity for their community activities. The current area is no longer offering sufficient space, particularly for the two large bell boats which are used for group and community activities with local schools. The boats hold up to 12 children and are particularly important for safely accommodating children with disabilities and their carers. The current compound restrictions are limiting use of these accessible boats. It is envisaged that the extended area will allow the larger bell boats to be stored on trailers for ease of use and will also accommodate canoe racking for a number of boats not currently stored at the Centre.

Pangbourne Parish Council is always keen to support the work carried out by a small team of volunteers at Adventure Dolphin, who continue to strive to preserve the Centre as a local facility for use by our community. Councillors are therefore supportive in principle of the extension given the relatively small area of the Meadows that will be used.

As part of the planning process, Adventure Dolphin will be required to demonstrate to Planning Officers how the proposal meets an identified need and provides a public benefit.

We would like to seek comments from residents prior to the full planning application in order to gauge wider public opinion on the proposed transfer of this small area of Council-owned land.

which, like a defibrillator, is accessed by calling 999. A further throwline is available at the toll booth on the bridge.

Did you know that there are also defibrillators at the Recreation Ground Toilets, Adventure Dolphin Centre and Working Men's Clubs. All are publicly available and sited on external walls.

New Name for 143 Bus Service

From Monday 2nd September the 143 bus service operated by Thames Travel and Oxford Bus company will no longer operate.

A new service, the number 43 will commence and will be operated by Reading Bus company. The twice daily service which runs to Langtree school will be re-named the number 93 service (replacing the BB3).

The service remains largely unchanged, however, with the exception of the Langtree bus, it will no longer run onwards to Goring. At the time of going to press, we have been sent the proposed new timetable, however, please do check exact details on bus stops or the operator's website if you intend to travel.



A word from our Rector, Rev Mark Hopkins

Dear Friends,

Over the Summer I was appointed as a chaplain to the LGBTQIA+ community for the Diocese of Oxford in addition to my role as Rector of Pangbourne, Tidmarsh and Sulham. Whilst the most common question I get asked in church is "what do all the letters stand for" (Lesbian-Gay-Bisexual-Transgender-Queer/Questioning-Intersex-Asexual +) the role of the chaplaincy is essentially to provide a confidential safe space for people to talk about matters of faith with regards to sexuality and gender identity. Sadly, the church has historically been (and often continues to be) a place which isn't comfortable for those of a different sexuality or gender identity to feel they can belong.

Our vision for Pangbourne, Tidmarsh and Sulham churches is for us to become more inclusive and welcoming to those who have faith or are exploring faith and want to learn more about Christianity but might have felt "put off" in the past. We are continuing our seminar series on

"becoming more inclusive" in the autumn with sessions on ethnicity, neurodiversity and gender, and how we can seek to continue making our church a



welcoming and safe place for faith and worship.

Please do check out our regular services and activities. In Autumn these will include Harvest festivals at Pangbourne and Sulham and a Harvest Supper; St James' Café on the first and third Wednesday of the month, and the Oasis bereavement group on the fourth Thursday of each month.







What's on in St James-the-Less








To mark Baby Loss Awareness Week (9th-15th October) a prayer and remembrance station will be set up at the back of St James.

How on earth did they do it? Spanish Bush

'Spanish Bush' seems a crazy title for an article on Pangbourne placenames, especially since the sole entry for it is Spanyshe Busshe, appearing once only as a fieldname in a document of 1548 – and no, I do not know which part of Pangbourne is involved either. The English Place-name Society volumes for Berkshire, published in 1971-72, can offer no explanation for the name, so what is being referred to? The answer, which has only emerged in recent years, may be a surprise.

The Spanyshe Busshe is liquorice, as in Bassetts Liquorice Allsorts. The plant grows to 2 metres, is a member of the pea family, and is native to Western Asia, North Africa and Southern Europe. It was introduced to England at an uncertain date in the Middle Ages by Spanish monks, whence its name, who joined Pontefract Priory in Yorkshire. By the 16th century there is a record of it being grown relatively widely in monastic gardens and as a garden crop for the gentry on alluvial soils, light and free draining as in the Thames Valley. I suspect that the monks of Reading Abbey are responsible for the Pangbourne reference, and the plant is probably referred to locally

also in Spanish Green, Stratfield Turgis. However, by 1780 serious liquorice growing was concentrated almost wholly in Pontefract, Yorkshire, and around Godalming, Surrey.

The climate in England is not warm enough for the plant to flower, the interest being in the root, from which the black extract is made. Its main purpose was as a medicine to ease coughs and stomach complaints, and by the end of the 16th century it was being made into lozenges, called 'Pontefract cakes'. Since 1612 these have been embossed with a trademark, and until the last century this was implanted on them by hand by workers known as 'cakers'.

Another, and perhaps more surprising member of the pea family is gorse. The brilliant yellow flowers of the common gorse readily catch the eye, especially as it blooms a little in late autumn and through the winter, coming into flower most strongly in the spring. Sprigs were a traditional May Day gift between young lovers in the West Country, and as sub-species continue flowering through the

summer, the country saying arose that "When gorse is out of blossom, kissing's out of fashion."

Gorse is also known as furze, although any etymological connection between the two words is not known. Both appear occasionally in minor names locally, as at Gorse Covert, Greenham and Furze Road, Tadley, although the sandy soil that the shrub prefers is not often present in our area. I suspect that the reason the shrub does not feature more frequently is partly because it has a relatively restricted range of uses. Gorse is highly nutritious, so it was used for winter fodder for horses and cattle, but it is prickly, so it had to be cut and crushed. Also, gorse burns rapidly, to a high temperature and with very little ash, making it important for heating ovens for baking, as well as in brick and lime kilns.

Broom, brom in Anglo-Saxon, is also a member of the pea family, and similar in appearance to gorse, but without the spines. Brom originally referred to a wider range of thorny shrubs such as gorse and bramble, but later came to be restricted to the plant as we know it today. It was the defining feature of Bramshill, and of the clearing (-ley) at Bramley. It appears regularly in minor names, such as Broom Copse, Purley and Broomclose Plantation, Pangbourne.

Being easier to handle than the spiny gorse, broom was used more widely. In addition to the list of uses for gorse, it was useful as emergency thatching and fencing. As brushwood it was used for repairing sinking roads and creating or repairing causeways like those leading to fords or bridges. Nationally, 24 Brompton names, meaning 'settlement (-ton) where broom grows', are close to rivers and streams.

The fronds of broom are no longer used for sweeping purposes, but it is the shrub that has given its name to the domestic utensil. Besom brooms are in fact still produced by hand, but now only birch twigs are used. The Nash family at Tadley has been in the trade for about 300 years, and Bradley Nash was, By Appointment to HM The Queen, the Royal Warrant holder for the Manufacture of Besom Brooms and Pea Sticks. He is officially described by the ancient title of 'broomsquire', meaning that he makes besom brooms for a living. His brooms have appeared in the Johnny Depp film Dark Shadows and in Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire, after which he got orders from all over the world.

Reference to Butlers Broom, Pangbourne might suggest an unusual purchase from Collins, but since this is in fact a fieldname recorded in 1839, reference must be to the shrub, and not the utensil. So, it can't even be claimed that a butler was sweeping round a Spanish bush.

CHURCH COTTAGE 2024

It is 100 years since a well known author purchased Church Cottage; now after several ownerships it is For Sale again. As the cottage is Grade Two listed, no major changes have taken place to the exterior since then and it has become part of the Pangbourne Heritage.

I was interested to find out more about the origins of the building. The oldest part of the living space



was constructed in 1764, but the flint wall at the rear, backing on to the cburchyard of St James, is at least 100 years older than that. If you look at what surrounds the dwelling today; the Old Smithy and the cottages opposite, the Cross Keys, the Mill, the High Street,


the Elephant and the Church itself, you can see that you are looking at eighteenth century Pangbourne. (The Lock Up, a round building in the present garden of Church Cottage was just that, there being no police officers to round up wrong doers until they faced the magistrates. By the mid nineteenth century this practice had become obsolete.)

Most of Pangbourne was owned by the Breedon Estate, which included the business premises and cottage industries as part of the revenue owing to the Manor of Bere Court. By 1841 the first census of the village showed buildings extending to the river in one direction and as far as the Breedon School just beyond the Square. It is likely that Church Cottage was occupied by a Basket Maker named Charles Cooper. Baskets were widely used in Fishing, Farming and for carrying goods on the newly established Railway, as well as for domestic use.

By 1865 the Church had been rebuilt (except for the Tower) and renamed but Church Cottage remained much as it was until 1894 when the entire Breedon Estate was auctioned off in 40 lots, one of which included Church Cottage. The new owner wasted no time in employing Leonard Stokes, a leading architect to design improvements and extensions to the property. The high standards of Stokes Designs were published in the Architectural Review of 1897.

Other examples of his work that you can see in Pangbourne include the present Masonic Hall, Hill House and Little Court in Shooters Hill, improvements and extensions to Weirpool, and the East side of the Square including what were Lloyds and the Midland Banks. The style is similar and has been modified in newer constructions or redevelopments.

Kenneth and Elspeth Grahame bought Church



Cottage in 1924 and asked Leonard Stokes to extend it further. For the author it was a place of homecoming, close to his beloved River Thames with countryside that

he had known in boyhood years when living near Cookham. Having written his famous work of Children's Fiction, the Wind and the Willows in 1908, and lost his only son Alastair for whom the stories of Toad were written, he was disinclined to publish anything further, and spent his days walking or sitting in his garden. Elspeth, whom he had married comparatively late in life was more inclined to be sociable. Kenneth Grahame did agree to address the Pangbourne Literary Guild when she was Vice President. He also talked to children as they walked to school (now Stokes View). He presented the school with a signed copy of his book, which was put in a glass case. (where is it now, I wonder?)

EH Shepard, the illustrator, came to the house in 1930, and talked with the author about the drawings for a new edition of the book he hoped to do. He was told by Kenneth Grahame'l love these little people, be kind to them'. What an epitaph.

Twinning of St Andrews school Pangbourne and Francois Mauriac college Houdan.

For the past three years I have been working at St Andrew's school as Head of Modern Languages. We run a year 7 trip to France once a year, but apart from that, like many schools, we do not have contact with other French schools. This was all set to change.

A few weeks before the trip, along with my two year 7 French colleagues, I got my class to write a letter (this time in English) to a new pen-pal (a concept that needed some explaining to our current modern 11-year-olds!) in Houdan. We

During my trip to Houdan, I met with a French teacher (Julie Peron) and we exchanged letters. This was again a very new concept for them to receive a hand-written letter.

In the photos here, you can see the joy in their faces as they read information (trying to decipher the French handwriting) from their new pen-pals.

It felt like Christmas! Since this time, we have continued to build on these initial exchanges with a letter and a video about their school.

We look forward to broadening this further to our year 6s and new year 7s from September. It is so good, as a teacher, to give pupils a genuine reason to do a piece of work and this new twinning venture really



seems to be ticking this box in every way.

We look forward to welcoming you.





Taking care of the environment


In June the club ran it annual 'Big Paddle Cleanup' day where volunteers cleared rubbish from the river, focusing this year on the downstream stretch from Whitchurch Bridge to Mapledurham. The club is also involved in the 'Thames21' water quality campaign, where independent bi-weekly testing has shown that the Whitchurch Bridge



area has consistently 'Good' water quality. Half a mile further down steam (the Sulham Brook inlet) varies between 'Good' and 'Poor'. Although we should never be complacent, our stretch of the river is proving much safer for canoeing and swimming than further down the river at Henley and Marlow.


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Pangbourne Art Group





Message from The Boathouse Surgery

Dear Patient,

We are always looking for ways to improve your access to GP appointments, as demand continues to rise. We are aware of the increasing wait times for routine GP appointments and have listened to your concerns. Following research, we have found an effective solution that will change the way you access our services. On Monday 30th September, we will be introducing a GP led Total Triage system.

All requests for GP appointments and queries (routine and urgent) will be reviewed by our triage doctor, on the same day, and an appointment will be offered as clinically appropriate.

We want to make sure patients are getting the advice and access they need in a timely manner, in line with their clinical needs.

You should no longer telephone the practice to book a GP appointment. Bookings will be replaced with a new, quick and simple online triage form on our website. This can be accessed through our website (The Boathouse Surgery (pangbournesurgery. co.uk) between 8 am – 4 pm, Monday to Friday. If you have an urgent medical need after 4pm, please call the surgery and you will be seen.

Whilst this system will be easily accessible for most patients; for those that don't have access to the internet please call our reception team who will be able to assist you by completing the online request form for you. You are welcome to come to the surgery and speak to them in person, should you prefer.

Once the GP has triaged your request, the outcome may be:

- An urgent appointment that day with the appropriate clinician (GP / Paramedic / Nurse Practitioner)
- An urgent GP appointment
- A routine GP appointment
- Referral for relevant tests
- A nurse appointment
- A reply via your chosen contact method for queries that do not need an appointment
- Passed on to our clinical pharmacist team for relevant medication queries

- Passed on to our admin team, such as medial secretaries, for relevant queries
- A referral to our social prescriber

Signposted to other providers, such as community pharmacy, physiotherapy, minor injuries, or 111.

Please note, there is no change to the booking of nurse or health care assistant appointments for the time being – these appointments can be arranged by phoning the surgery, as usual. Please only book a blood test if you have been requested to do so by a clinician.

We would like to remind patients that if they are experiencing life-threatening symptoms, please dial 999, or if you're unsure what service you need consider using 111 online.

Over the next six weeks, we will have limited availability, as our current system winds down (routine appointments are not available to book beyond 1st October when the new system starts). All urgent and acute medical needs will still be seen and dealt with appropriately.

Many neighbouring practices are now using this system, and feedback has been very positive with the average wait for a routine appointment reduced to 10 days.

The form will allow you to state your preferred contact method so that we can get in touch with you following triage. This may be via email, a phone call, or a text message which may include a booking link to allow you to book the appropriate appointment at your convenience.

If you have any questions or concerns regarding the new Total Triage system, please send these to us via our online feedback form (Feedback | The Boathouse Surgery (pangbournesurgery.co.uk) or in writing for the attention of the practice manager. We will then be able to produce and share an FAQ to answer these. Please do not call our reception team with questions or queries.

Thank you for support and understanding as we make this transition – we hope this will improve care and continuity, enabling those who need to see a GP, to do so promptly.



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

I am reading "God is an Octopus" by Ben Goldsmith, a story of Loss, Love and A Calling to Nature.

The death of Ben's daughter at fifteen and a half in an accident breaks his heart and he describes his grief journey and how he is soothed by the recognition of the power of nature to bring meaning to life and loss. Ben is a British environmentalist and is very involved in the rewilding movement, global and national conservation. He was a Director at DEFRA for five years where he advocated for environment restoration policies and the Species Reintroduction Taskforce among many other initiatives.

In his book he advocates for us all to see the inextricable links and dependency we have with all other species, flora and fauna and how it is at our peril that we exterminate nature in our pursuit of more, more and more consumption. This is a painful but delightful book and I thoroughly recommend it.

We have had several events in the last two months celebrating nature. On the 20 June we had an excellent evening with Ailsa Claybourne who gave a talk on "Scintillating Swifts in Pangbourne". Ailsa has been a keen



birder all her life, but it was on retirement that she noticed the decline in Swifts. She began to lead walks and provide environment education locally. She realised that talks about the constant doom and decline of birds is contributing to climate anxiety and poor mental health and set out to give talks on success stories and what positive actions we can do to be more positive. There was so much to learn about these brave, strong, beautiful little birds and I point you to PAWs website for a full description by Kat Syfret of the evening spent with Ailsa.

Some quick facts:-

Swifts are migratory, travelling from Equatorial Africa and Southern Africa.

Swifts are aerial, fast and fantastic travellers.

They eat amazing meals, flying through clouds of insects, with their beaks gaping, and collect 300 insects at a time!

They sleep with half their brain-sleeping at 10,000 feet, go down to 25 feet and then up again.

They can stay aloft for 4 years at a time, fly 4 million miles and fly at 70 mph.

They have beautiful tidy nests, the parents eat the droppings of their young, recycling the nutrients.

They don't breed until they are 4 years old.

Swifts come back to various sites in Pangbourne every year and they need old buildings; they are site faithful, returning to the same site each year to breed. If their nests are destroyed, they might never breed again. If you want to encourage them please look at the article on the web site or visit https://www.swift-conservation.org/ or Facebook.



On the 30th June, we had our annual visit to James Norman's organic hay meadow at Hardwick in Whitchurch. Over 40 people assembled to look at, discuss, learn and enjoy this sublime meadow. It is only harvested for grass for James' organic beef cattle once seed has been set from the enormous variety of flower and grass species. This year new species are emerging from the ground that lay under water for several months in our very wet winter and spring. The rain had a big effect on the distribution of grasses and their height. In this beautiful environment we watched a flock of lapwings, swifts, swallows and a lone buzzard. With a cup of tea and cakes at the end and with a great deal of knowledge gained from expert botanists we had a perfect Sunday afternoon.

On the 1st July we had a hugely entertaining evening when Jackie and Brian Hoskins delighted us with their story of their time in Japan in April where Brian received the Japan Prize from the Emperor. A village hall of full of people very proud of Brian, his work and contribution to climate science.

On the 25th July we enjoyed a talk by Andrew McAlister Hood entitled "Living Wild at Home, a summer performance". Andrew is a sculptor, based at Path Hill, Whitchurch, who lives to enjoy life with nature. He has worked as a sculptor for fifteen years after training at Weymouth College in stone masonry. Despite producing work he found it hard to make ends meet and eventually decided to keep his studio but let

go of his house. Previously in the army he had basic skills for living on the land and he decided as his work is profoundly impacted by nature to immerse himself in a life living closely with and in nature. He now sleeps in the woods, using a sleeping bag and tarpaulin to keep out the rain. He describes feeling fitter and healthier for his life constantly in the fresh air, foraging for his food. He has a bike to transport his few things and sleeps in different areas of the woods. He started wild swimming many years ago and extols the virtue of cold water. He has researched the science of sleeping on the ground and agrees with the experiences of forest dwellers and nomads which support the fact that they suffer less musculoskeletal lesions than we

house bound, bed bound people do!

As his shoes gradually fell apart Andrew has discovered the benefits of being barefoot. He rarely suffers pain in his feet and finds running barefoot a freeing experience. You may see him running through Pangbourne occasionally.

Through this lived in experience Andrew examines human dependence upon the natural world and compares the scientific world's discoveries in this field, with his own experiences, as a man who, because of circumstances and inclination, must wander through and sleep in wild places of England, every night; seeking shelter, refuge and sustenance. He believes that human and environmental degradation as a result of their unhealthy relationship with each other, are also subject to the stone sculptor's scrutiny.

His presentation, along with images of his work and drawings of work in progress provided us with a unique take on life and how it can be lived.

Inspired, I went home and retrieved my tent from the loft and am now enjoying the calm and stillness of summer nights under canvas with of course the advantages of running water and flushing toilet!


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
